He is Dene from Tsuut'ina Nation, is also known as Redfoot, and was disappointingly not in his regular cosplay as Hagrid from Harry Potter, Barf from Spaceballs, Leatherface from Texas Chainsaw Massacre. And yes, because his name sounds very Jedi-y, his light saber is blue.

-Alex Flett is marketing and Elder support/oskapios. He is Swampy Cree from Wuskwi Sipihk, and is interested in hunting, fishing, and all things on-the-land.

-Kori "Chewbacca" is the host and producer of the pod, with ancestry to the Jobin family of Big Prairie, has been doing her hair like Rae's for 20+ years (I guess Rae stole her hairstyle), and has a PhD in Indigenous Mathematics. She has been on an ongoing journey to reconnect mathematics and science with its origins of specific Lands and cultures from around the world.

-Connections between Science Fiction and Indigenous Cultures:

- -Leia's Hair
 - -inspired by Hopi Peoples, representing resilience and independence of women and sometimes known as the *Squash Blossom Whorl*, marking initiation, naming, and fertility ceremonies.
 - -"The Real Princess Leia" by MessyNessy
 - -"Leia's Bun Hairstyle" by Erika Schmitte
- -Rae's Hair
 - -stolen from Kori (haha)
- -Ancestor's/Teacher's from another dimension/planet/universe
 - -**Wookie**: from the big people family, often representing honesty and truth. These stories are common around the world, a larger creature that is mysterious, sometimes as a sasquatch, giant, yeti, or bigfoot.
 - **-Ewok**: possibly based on the little people (not referencing people of short stature or dwarfs), who often plays tricks on humans to teach lessons. I have been told to be aware to not speak about them too much, or if you do, leave out an offering for them. I have been told they like sparkly things and sweets.
 - -Barf: based on a rez dog!

Hal Eagletail, from Tsuut'ina, shared that there are four communities of the landhumans, little people, big people, and water people.

- -**Yoda**/Baby Yoda: the wise ones, in deep connection with the frequencies and teachings of the Land.
- -the **Force**: There is communication amongst those with "the force" through methods beyond the standard, rational, observable, scientific method, such as telecommunication and premonitions.

-Indigenous Science Fiction:

-<u>Drew Hayden Taylor</u>: there are similar themes between Indigenous stories and science fiction. "<u>Like Science Fiction? You should try Indigenous stories</u>" (youtube).

- -"aliens" travelling to Earth
- "Indigenous People and the Extraterrestrial" (article)

-Many Science Fiction narratives are based on how Earth has already gone through an apocalypse, but Indigenous people have already experienced this, and Indigenous Science Fiction is about the future, revitalization, and resilience beyond the apocalypse.

-Indigenous Science Fiction Themes:

- -beyond colonial time
 - "Arizona's Mysterious Clock of Ancient Times" BBC (article)
 - *note, this isn't a "mystery" its more about western scientists trying to squeeze non-standard scientific knowledges into the standard method. Just ask an Elder...
- -beyond standard/universal/Western/global Scientific methods
 - -portals and non-colonial time
 - -Ancestors/relatives as non-*********
 - -communications and knowledge through inter-generational DNA. Alex mentioned "I have DNS in my blood from generations in the past, and maybe some of my experiences are from there."

- -beyond human senses
 - -Emil spoke about sleep paralysis. What if its required to halt our physical senses in order to communicate through a beyond human dimensional sense? A communication that is disconnected from the human body... -embracing and learning from beyond standard/generalizable senses, such as dreams, intuition, Déjà vu....

- -Aliens as Star people
 - -Indigenous people have always said "we come from the stars"
